How to Use this Program

Finding Sessions

First, review the session listings for each day and decide which you will attend. You may come and go as you please as the sessions are continuous and not concurrent.

Both days occur in a specific Zoom “Room.” The “Room” listed has a unique URL that will be used continuously across all sessions. Selecting the link will launch Zoom (app or web page) so you can attend the presentation. Session titles are also linked to the Zoom room.

Plan to join each room a few minutes before the session begins using links in this program. These will be live Zoom rooms and we will not be using the “webinar” feature, but guests will be muted initially.

Getting Started with the Zoom Service

Zoom rooms can be accessed through a web browser, desktop application or mobile application.

If accessing through a mobile device, [download](#) and install the Zoom application prior to the online conference. When you select a link from the conference guide or email, you will be prompted to join the session by launching the app or [through your web browser](#).

Live Captioning

We will use otter.ai for live captioning. A link to the live caption webpage will be provided during the session. In the event that the live caption does not function, the room host will type captions as backup.

Using Zoom During the Presentation

Microphone access and video is disabled for session attendees, but you can participate by:

1. Addressing questions to the presenter using the Chat button with comments directed to “Everybody.” The Chat button is located in the toolbar at the bottom of the screen. Questions will be saved for the end. At the end of the session, the host may enable attendee audio for general discussion.
2. Addressing comments to fellow participants using the Chat button (talk bubble icon) located in the toolbar at the bottom of the screen.

Adjust the size of the presentation window by selecting the four arrows at the top, right of the screen. Exit full screen by selecting the “Exit Full Screen” button on the top of the screen.

Leave the session at any time by selecting the “Leave Meeting” button in the lower right of the screen.

Troubleshooting

Issues with Audio

- Check your audio settings by selecting “Audio Settings” in the lower right of the screen.
- Try logging out of Zoom and logging back in. You might also need to reboot your computer. Make sure that, if you have the Zoom app installed, you are using the latest version.
- Refer to [Zoom technical support](#) – as a small conference, there will be limited tech help support while sessions are live.

Internet & Connection Issues

- If the presenter experiences connection issues, please be patient. The room host will guide discussion and quiet general tumult until the presenter can continue.
- Sessions will be recorded. The committee will attempt to make sessions available after the conference.
